COURSE SYLLABUS

Course Description and Objectives:

This course focuses on poetic works and perspectives emerging between approximately the end of the nineteenth century and the middle of the twentieth. Selected texts will be analyzed and discussed in connection with relevant historical and theoretical contexts, as well as in relation to other artistic or broader cultural developments. The course provides various conceptual and analytical perspectives on these works, and an opportunity for students to become familiar with some of the experimental approaches to form, content, and aesthetics that develop during this period, as well as with various conceptions of “modernism.”

Course Activities

During the semester, the methods of analyzing poetry and the characteristics of modernism will be discussed in relation to the various aspects of the poems selected particularly from English literature. To be able to create a vivid and fruitful atmosphere of discussion in the class each student should

1. Read the assigned chapters and poems **in advance**,
2. Participate in class discussions and do research on the related topics,
3. Present the assigned poems in class,
4. Attend one midterm and one final exam.

Course Material

Students will be provided with a collection of poems and essays as a reading packet. The text has been taken from:
